


## Healing Justice Defined

"Healing Justice is a political strategy conceived in 2005, and formally launched in 2006 by the Kindred Southern Healing Justice Collective to intervene and respond on generational trauma and systemic oppression, and build community/survivor led responses rooted in southern traditions of resiliency to sustain our emotional/physical/spiritual/psychic and environmental well being."

### The State of BIPOC Youth Mental Health



- 64% of Black children and 51% of Hispanic children have family histories that include Adverse Childhood Experiences...compared to 40% of white children
- Prior to COVID-19, BIPOC communities faced disparities in access to healthcare, which contributes to increased mental health risks; e.g., nearly twice the rate of suicide among Black children versus white children
- Black youth who identify as LGBTTQIA+ face the same increased mental health disparities as other LGBTTQIA+ youth, yet more so for Black gender nonconforming youth compared to cisgender Black LGBTTQIA+ youth
- Despite having similar rates of mental health disparities, Black LGBTTQIA+ youth are significantly less likely to receive professional care
- COVID-19 has exacerbated mental health stressors for girls of color and amplified the need for increased capacity for people of color-led organizations to support them

The Trevor Project



- The purpose of Taking Root is to creatively increase access to mental health supports for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) girls and gender expansive youth by expanding the trauma-informed culturally responsive programming and service offerings we provide where young people can root themselves in ancestral healing practices to promote liberation from generational trauma, gender-based violence, and oppression.
- The Healing Justice team partners with youth, staff, healing justice and mental health practitioners, and community partners to develop and integrate innovative mental health supports that are rooted in trauma-informed, culturally responsive best practices and healing justice strategies.
- We provide ongoing mental health support and resources for staff to combat burnout culture and ensure that we can provide the highest quality services to youth and their families.
- Youth build agency to support their own journey towards mental health and wellness in community with other BIPOC youth, mentors and practitioners. Powerful Voices is working with BIPOC girls and gender expansive youth to harness their inherent strengths, increase access to resources, and advocate for their mental health needs.

## OFFERINGS

### **Group Healing Sessions**

Group sessions for BIPOC youth led by a licensed child and family therapist, somatics practitioner, and other wellness practitioners with a focus on culturally responsive trauma informed strategies rooted in healing justice.

## Mental Health and Wellness Cohorts

Community-based and in-school cohorts that address the mental health impacts of gender-based violence and provide healing and prevention strategies through an intersectional Black feminist framework.

## Youth-Led Support Sessions

Peer-led healing circles where youth can build community and gain valuable knowledge and skills from one another.

## Individual Therapy and Wellness Sessions

Free therapy sessions with a licensed child and family therapist, somatics practitioner, or another wellness practitioner with a focus on culturally responsive healing justice strategies.

### Wellness Practitioner Referral List

A vetted database of BIPOC mental health and wellness practitioners to provide services to BIPOC girls and gender expansive youth.

### Wellness Speaker Series

Consciousness raising panel discussions related to mental health, wellness and healing justice featuring BIPOC women and gender expansive professionals in the healthcare field.

## Challenges

- Sometimes money is allocated to a position and then that role becomes vacant, resulting in unused funds
- With the BBP, there are clients who pick and choose their services.
   This sometimes causes a gap in funding and budgeting.

## What We Learned

- Hard to provide care and education with a lack of funding. Ex. Some people don't understand the importance of a doula. Lactation is important but not a focus of the project.
  - There should be an increase in salaries for allocation.

"On top of everything they did, they have so many resources available to us like lactation specialist, yoga, baby baskets full of supplies, and so much more. Everytime someone asks me what Midwives I recommend I always say the Rainier Valley Midwives"

### PROGRAM GOALS




- Reduce the stigma around symptoms of mental illness, diagnosis, and treatment
- Reduce the distrust/fears around mental health providers
- Build a greater understanding of the public health system and how public schools, doctors, and mental health care providers work together
- Continually educating and raising awareness on mental health impacts on individuals in the Somali Community
- Normalize conversations about mental health and discuss how war trauma impacts opportunities.
- Provide preventative and intervention services before families reach the point of calling emergency services like
   911.
- Ensure that this program reduces or eliminates barriers to successful engagement for the Somali community


### SERVICES WE PROVIDE

- In-House Mental Health Case Management and Referrals. The service allows you to work with trained social workers that will provide evidence-based care management service for symptoms of mental illness and create a care plan so clients can receive referrals for their unique resource needs.
- Host Culturally Responsive Workshops. These are educational workshops used to educate the Somali community and engage in dialogue that helps destigmatize mental health and foster healthier practices.
- Serve as a Resource Hub by Developing and Distributing Comprehensive Mental Health Resource Guides and educational materials. This service provides comprehensive and culturally competent resources regarding mental health in the King County area for individuals in need.
- Somali Youth Mental Health programs. Somali Youth Mental Health Awareness program is a youth-centered Mental health education program that will focus on mental wellness and a variety of mental health topics while being culturally sensitive and allowing a safe space for open discussions.
- Host Community Gatherings. This service provides a safe and positive space for community members to make connections, have conversations, build rapport, and share resources.
- Drugs and substance abuse training for community members. This service was designed for a community member to have access to life-saving training and is a part of continually educating the Somali community on diverse health topics.







Transform the lives of individuals and their communities through innovative and effective addiction treatment and social services.


### **OUR WORK**

Clinic Services - Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) that provides medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD) with wraparound services that include case management, therapeutic counseling, physical and behavioral health care, outreach, and housing and employment services.

**REACH Programs** - Community-based outreach case management for people experiencing homelessness. Includes targeted street-based outreach, integrated care management, housing access and support, and advocacy work around criminal legal system transformation.

## TREATMENT IN MOTION (TIM) PROJECT





### TIM PROJECT GOALS

- Increase access to health resources by initiating a mobile treatment program for OUD that combines outreach with clinical expertise, using a holistic, collaborative approach to target and provide services to underserved communities and people that are disproportionately impacted by OUD.
- Improve health outcomes for individuals with OUD by creating partnerships with organizations serving clientele often not able to access MOUD treatment, by bringing lifesaving treatment directly to those in need, and by establishing a system that supports routine access to care and sustained treatment that are critical for MOUD's success.



**EXPANDING ACCESS & ADDRESSING DISPARITIES** 

TIM will provide community-based, low-barrier, rapid-access MOUD treatment for persons in King County who are:

- Actively using opioids
- Experiencing homelessness
- Members of communities of color
- · Members of the LGBTQ+ community
- Involved in the criminal legal system
- Living in low-income communities
- Located in an area with limited recovery resources



#### **IMPROVING HEALTH OUTCOMES**

TIM will provide routine access to care and sustained treatment with the hope of achieving the following outcomes:

- Reduce drug use consequences among TIM patients.
- Engage TIM patients in substance-use treatment with a minimum retention goal of 50% at 90 days of treatment engagement.
- Reduce TIM patients' emergency department (ED) utilization.
- Increase the number of TIM patients receiving Case Management support.
- Build community linkages by establishing partnerships with at least six organizations to enhance services already present in targeted communities.



#### Bridging the chase between individuals and healthcare

- Access to person-centered substance use disorder service
- Lived experience blended with trauma-informed service delivery to enable the first steps toward achieving selfidentified goals.
- Seeking help for behavioral health matters and substance use disorder while unhoused has proven ineffective. Providing safe lodging in a secure environment with direct access to trained staff and supportive services can insipire hope.

#### Growing our network inside the CoLEAD framework


- Partnerships with a variety of treatment services aligned with our approach to participant care.
- Care coordination between CoLEAD and area hospitals, the legal justice system and additional allies deliver compassionate care centered in harm-reduction philosophies.
- Adding more or modifying existing lodging sites with increased avaiability of on-site services in order help more individuals with higher and at the same, increased efficiency.
- Community awareness and public education building partnerships that help in the prevention of repeating past experiences of harm and injury much of this population has been conditioned expect.

#### Healthcare

#### Access & Outcomes

Addressing social determinants of health, and building bridges to health care, by providing comprehensive care to people at risk of involvement with the legal system due to behavioral health issues, substance use disorder, and homelessness.

- Increased connection to primary care
- Achieved growth of participant access to Mental Health and SUD Assessments ad Treatment
- Direct administration and distribution of overdose prevention supplies

- Launched with community funds
  - first \$25,000 raised from community
- Organizing an active patient base
   building power to change policies & systems that make us unwell
- Creating a community-led healthcare system

with the clinical services, health justice programs, research, and advocacy our communities want and need

In a multimedia community visioning session, community shares ideas, insights, and wants for our health care.

Tubman Health held 12 community design sessions in 2022 to guide development of our flagship health center.

#### Our Blaxinate Campaign

redesigned the vaccination experience around trust and community connection in a VIP lounge setting.
